## IENGLISH IS UNIQUE

- A single sound is represented by various letters.

Eg. Did he believe that Caesar could see the people seize the seas?
The silly amoeba stole the key to the machine.
/i:/ is represented by e, ie, ae, ee, eo, ei, ea, y, oe, ey, and $\mathbf{i}$.

- Various sounds are represented by a letter.

Eg. My father wanted many a village dame badly.
$a$ is pronounced as $/ \Lambda, D, e, ~ ə, I, e I, ~ æ /$

- A single sound is represented by a combination of letters.

| Eg. | shoot | character | Thomas | physics |
| :---: | :---: | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| either | deal | rough | nation |  |
|  | coat | glacial | theater | plain |

- Two sounds are represented by a letter. Eg. $x$ is pronounced/ks/as in six $u$ is pronounced/ju/ as in use
- Silent letters (no sounds)

| Eg. mnemonic | autumn | resign ghost |
| :---: | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| pterodactyl | write | hole corps |
| psychology | sword | debt gnome |
| bough | lamb | island knot |
